Since 1916, members of the Kiwanis Club of Indianapolis have dedicated themselves to serving our city and furthering the education and leadership development of its youth, building the backbone of our community's future. Our motto, "We build," is the simplest and most powerful embodiment of our mission.

Through our Kiwanis Foundation of Indianapolis, we have raised hundreds of thousands of dollars for community and school projects, as well as scholarships for deserving local students. Equally important, our members have spent countless volunteer hours mentoring youth, advising youth groups and providing services that benefit the greater Indianapolis community. Driving our Kiwanian efforts are a strong love for our beautiful city, friendships, teamwork and a fervent belief that lives can be improved for our city's children and youth.

We know the profound impact of our work from the stories of young people who have overcome enormous challenges to attend college with our help...of students in Key Clubs and other Kiwanis-sponsored school groups who have learned leadership and commitment to others through service projects of their own. And more stories...many from seriously sick children at Riley Hospital who finally can have a moment to let go of their troubles and smile, all thanks to the kindness of a Kiwanian volunteer.

About the Kiwanis Club of Indianapolis

The Kiwanis Club of Indianapolis is one of the oldest and largest of the approximately 7,500 Kiwanis clubs located around the world. The Kiwanis name is derived from an Indian phrase meaning, "We make noise," in order to reflect enthusiastic and unified service to the community, the hallmark of Kiwanis clubs worldwide.

Our membership consists of approximately 250 men and women from business, government, healthcare, education, nonprofit and other sectors. Many of these are well-known civic leaders who have been instrumental in shaping the city of Indianapolis and the state of Indiana. Members come together regularly for professional networking and camaraderie, to hear prominent speakers discuss civic needs and issues of the day and to develop and support programs that can benefit children and youth. Kiwanis provides opportunities to network, help those far less fortunate and establish friendships that often last a lifetime.

Our Club has been prominent in the worldwide Kiwanis community. Formed in May and chartered in October of 1916, the Kiwanis Club of Indianapolis was just the 18th club founded by Kiwanis International, which was started just the year before. Thanks to a few dedicated members who wanted to ensure the continuity of our programs for generations to come, we are one of only a couple of clubs that have a separate foundation. Our Kiwanis Foundation of Indianapolis, Inc. is a tax-deductible, non-profit fundraising and grant-making arm incorporated in 1949.

In 1981 our organization persuaded Kiwanis International to move its

headquarters to Indianapolis, and our Foundation pledged nearly \$1 million toward construction of its new building. Just a few years ago we led the fundraising efforts to fund the addition of a multi-lingual, techno-savvy auditorium named in honor of General Robert Moorhead, one of our longstanding members.

Our club hosted Kiwanis International's annual convention in 1937, 1992 and 2003, and will welcome thousands of Kiwanians from around the world in 2015, when we play host to worldwide convention attendees once again. There, we will celebrate the successful completion of our fundraising efforts for The Eliminate Project to help UNICEF eradicate neonatal and maternal tetanus around the globe. This is similar to the leadership role we assumed over a decade ago to rid the world of iodine deficiency. Local support for this project is critical for our Club to maintain a wider charitable perspective and play a role in global efforts. The Kiwanis Foundation of Indianapolis has pledged to match \$100,000 in Club member donations for this worldwide campaign to erase a painful and devastating disease.

We are proud to be a part of an international family of servant leaders. Together with other Kiwanis clubs, located in 80 nations, we focus on changing the world by serving children, one child and one community at a time. By working together, members achieve what one person cannot accomplish alone. In Indianapolis, we have seen that when you give a child the chance to learn, experience, dream, grow, succeed and thrive, great things happen!

Our Programs

Over the years, we have supported numerous nonprofit organizations through financial gifts and volunteerism. Our own programs fall into three broad groups:

scholarships, service projects and service leadership programs. Many of these are decades-old traditions; others are new efforts to address emerging issues affecting youth and our city. Over the past six years, more than \$1 million has been granted through our Foundation of Indianapolis, Inc. for these programs and other efforts that directly benefit central Indiana citizens.

Scholarship Programs:

The Kiwanis Abe Lincoln Scholarship Awards Program began in 1976, providing college scholarships for graduating high school students who have overcome tremendous obstacles in their lives. Each year, the club honors young people nominated by area high schools at a February flagship luncheon where, surrounded by family, teachers, friends, media and Kiwanians, they are recognized for their inspiring achievements. These students have succeeded in the face of poverty, homelessness, hunger, physical and mental challenges, isolation, and other hardships that would have caused others to give up. Over the years, many have become leading citizens in their communities and we are proud that some have joined the Kiwanis Club to carry the torch forward. Of these amazing students, four are selected each year through an interview process to receive scholarships totaling over \$40,000. Since starting this program, over 650 students from the Indianapolis metro area have been recognized, and our Foundation has awarded more than \$800,000 in scholarships.

With support from the Indiana Pacers, the Indianapolis Colts and backing from the IHSAA, Kiwanis Student Athlete Scholarships are awarded to top Marion County boys high school basketball and football players each year during special recognition luncheons eagerly anticipated by these student-athletes. The county's boys basketball players, as well as the “final eight” championship teams from around the state, are celebrated on the floor of Bankers Life Fieldhouse in tandem with the IHSAA state championships in March, while Marion County boys football student-athletes are honored in early December, most recently at Lucas Oil Stadium. Coaches, athletes, sports celebrities and media sports analysts add color to the events, capped off with a motivational talk from a respected sports giant. This longstanding scholarship program is a Kiwanis Club tradition, with over \$5,000 in financial assistance provided annually to student-athletes who most embody the values of Kiwanis: achievement, leadership and service to others.

The Lawrence E. and Maysel D. East Scholarships are awarded each year to students who wish to attend Butler University or the University of Indianapolis. Funded through a generous bequest from a 50-year club member made in the mid-1970's, these scholarships go to students, nominated by Butler University and the University of Indianapolis, who demonstrate academic excellence, leadership, citizenship and financial need. Final

candidates are carefully interviewed and selected by a committee of club members. Nearly \$500,000 has been awarded through this program.

The Kiwanis Improvement Program (“KIPS”) for Southport High School was originated by our club after we reached out to all Marion County high schools nearly 25 years ago. Each year at a special recognition luncheon, four Southport seniors who have demonstrated grade improvement and excellent attendance over several years receive \$1,000 scholarships, and a fifth student is selected for the coveted \$5,000 Dunham Scholarship. The program is funded by the club's foundation with assistance from longstanding Kiwanian Thomas Dunham and auto dealer Ray Skillman. Recently, we entered into a service partnership with the Kiwanis Club of Perry Township. Their members and school administrators have assumed most of the administrative work for the project.

Program Impact: In 2012, the downtown Kiwanis organization helped 16 deserving Marion County students attend college by awarding them a total of \$51,677 in financial scholarships.

Evaluation: Program and financial records, committee reports, personal interviews and student academic achievement reports received through their collegiate years are reviewed on an ongoing basis.

Service Projects: Riley Hospital for Children has been a longtime beneficiary of Kiwanis support. We helped to establish the trauma center at the hospital in the 1920's and continued to raise money for the hospital and its foundation over the next nine decades. Our current projects include staffing and supporting two Magic Castle Carts that provide "smile therapy" for young patients and their caregivers, presenting an annual carnival for hospital-bound kids, and purchasing adaptive bikes that allow children who are bravely facing tough physical challenges to get outside and be fun-flying youngsters again.

The Fostering Families Program was developed over 20 years ago to encourage, recognize and support the heroic efforts of parents who take into their homes and hearts the many children who are abandoned, abused or neglected. Exemplary foster parents selected by area children's agencies are honored at our annual Faith, Hope and Love luncheon, where they share their stories of love in action and receive practical gifts that will support them in their efforts. Committee members also invest their time and passion to reach out to foster children in crisis, so they know their community cares about them. We are a partner for emancipated foster youth, working in tandem with other organizations to help them integrate into our community and become contributing citizens after they "age out" of the foster care system at age 18.

Downtown Indianapolis beautification and tree plantings are conducted as a community service by Kiwanis Club members each year, working with Indianapolis Downtown, Inc. and IPL. But civic beautification is not the only purpose of this program; Club members work alongside

young people from seven Kiwanis-sponsored school groups and "handi-capable" adults from our sponsored Aktion Club, sharing with them sustainable planting tips and the joy that stems from community service. This past year we received the 2012 Outstanding Project award from the Indiana Urban Forest Council for promoting the principles of urban forestry through planting 88 trees in Martin Park.

Partners in Education works directly with the staff and students at IPS Harshman Magnet Middle School #101 to improve attendance and academic performance. Through our Foundation grant and by volunteering, Club members support reading programs, attendance incentives, an annual Dad's Breakfast

to encourage father and father figure school participation, Career Day and other efforts to boost grades and attitudes in school.

Our work with IPS Charity Dye Center for Inquiry III is part of Kiwanis International's ongoing Young Children Priority One focus on helping children under five years old. Currently we work with preschool and kindergarten teachers, contributing books and educational aids for its youngest students. In 2011 we

added a K-Kids Club for grade school students to develop confidence, leadership skills and an appreciation for community service.

Other community service projects vary from red kettle bell-ringing for the Salvation Army to collecting backpacks and school supplies for underprivileged students, toiletries for the Gennesaret Free Clinic, personal grooming items for the poor and homeless and gently-used mobile phones for our American troops.

Program Impact: In 2012, the Kiwanis Club of Indianapolis impacted over 235,000 children and families through local service projects.

Evaluation: We monitor the impact on an ongoing basis through program and financial records, as well as personal interviews with youth participants, local school faculty members, administrators and partnering organizations.

Service Leadership Programs: Kiwanis clubs are unique in that we are a family of servant-leaders. Our Club and Foundation provide volunteers and

financial support for eight other local clubs, based in schools and elsewhere, that do charitable projects of their own. By guiding these sponsored clubs, we can support service learning and citizenship, develop leaders, help build friendships and have a greater service impact upon Indianapolis and the greater metropolitan area.

A K-Kids Club for grade school children is sponsored at IPS Charity Dye Center for Inquiry III. Children in our K-Kids Club recently collected \$200 by selling candy bars to purchase diapers and formula for Dayspring Center residents – a great start to a lifetime of philanthropy.

A Builders Club for middle school youth is sponsored at IPS Francis W. Parker Montessori School #57. They recently collected 500 children's books to donate to the Children's Bureau, hosting a school dance where the admission price was "a buck and a book."

A Key Club at Perry Meridian High School is supported by our group, as well as a Northside New Era Club comprised of youth from various IPS high schools and the Starfish Initiative. A group of Perry Meridian Key Clubbers have been helping out at the Indianapolis Animal Shelter once a month, and they recently raised urgently-needed monies for The Eliminate Project by selling "candy-grams" to fellow students, administrators and faculty members.

Circle K Clubs for college students are sponsored at Butler University, IUPUI and the University of Indianapolis. The UIndy club had 87 participants in 2012, who logged 3,002 total service hours. They offer service projects nearly every day of the week, helping with several local community centers, homeless shelters and animal adoption

agencies, as well as raising funds for the March of Dimes and other non-profit groups.

An Aktion Club for adults living with disabilities also is sponsored by our organization. Patterned after a traditional Kiwanis Club, the Aktion Club meets monthly at Goodwill Industries. They participate in city beautification service projects, serve meals at Wheeler Mission, and have fun together duckpin bowling, attending hockey games and taking in the beauty of Christmas at the Zoo.

Program Impact: In 2012, Kiwanis Club of Indianapolis members provided guidance for eight local service clubs, impacting over 300 students and "handi-capable" adults who conduct activities that foster confidence, leadership, citizenship, friendships and philanthropy. Our Foundation provided \$25,890 in financial support to help these clubs attain their goals.

Evaluation: We monitor the impact on an ongoing basis through program and financial records, committee reports and personal interviews with youth and adult participants, local school faculty members,

administrators and partnering organizations. An annual Celebration of Service Leadership program for club members features a panel discussion with participants from all eight of our sponsored clubs sharing highlights, testimonials and impact out in our community.

Funding
Funding for these programs comes from tax-deductible gifts, bequests, memorials, special events and annual contributions by Club members and like-minded supporters. Sponsorships and grants, as well as interest and dividends, also provide a significant portion of our funding. Financial gifts are made through the Kiwanis Foundation of Indianapolis, Inc., which was established in 1949 as a 501(c)(3) organization legally charged with raising and appropriating project funding, and monitoring investments of funds provided for program purposes.

The Foundation's 11-member Board of Directors meets every other month to review finances and investments, approve funding requests and monitor fundraising efforts. The Club's various committees, chaired by volunteer members, focus on community service programs, our eight service leadership programs,

membership growth and other aspects of Club operations.

Why Support Our Efforts?

Studies show that a community that connects and cares about its children can impact their outcomes in a big way. A national report, "Finding Out What Matters for Youth," states that

through our various scholarship programs. And never has the financial need been greater. The recession hit hard in Marion County, and its effects continue to linger. The number of children and youth in poverty increased more than 32% in the last five years – adversely affecting their future education, health and wage-earning prospects. More kids want to go to college, but fewer families

These include better attendance and more positive attitudes at school, healthier and safer behaviors and an increased likelihood of pursuing post-secondary education.

The leadership and service opportunities that Kiwanis provides for kids through our sponsored Key Clubs, Circle K's and similar groups, can have lasting positive results. Studies consistently show that youth who volunteer and have a voice in developing and implementing service projects do better in life. They have higher self-esteem, are less likely to abuse drugs, alcohol and cigarettes, show greater academic progress and are more likely to attain higher levels of education than those who aren't civically engaged. Even as adults they are more likely to vote, have a positive work ethic, be philanthropic and have socially responsible attitudes.

Why support Kiwanis? By giving to our youth-focused service programs, you are offering local youth leadership opportunities to give and serve – multiplying the effects on those with need and improving their odds in life. You are giving them a chance to go to college and succeed. And you are preparing young people to be active, lifelong community citizens. 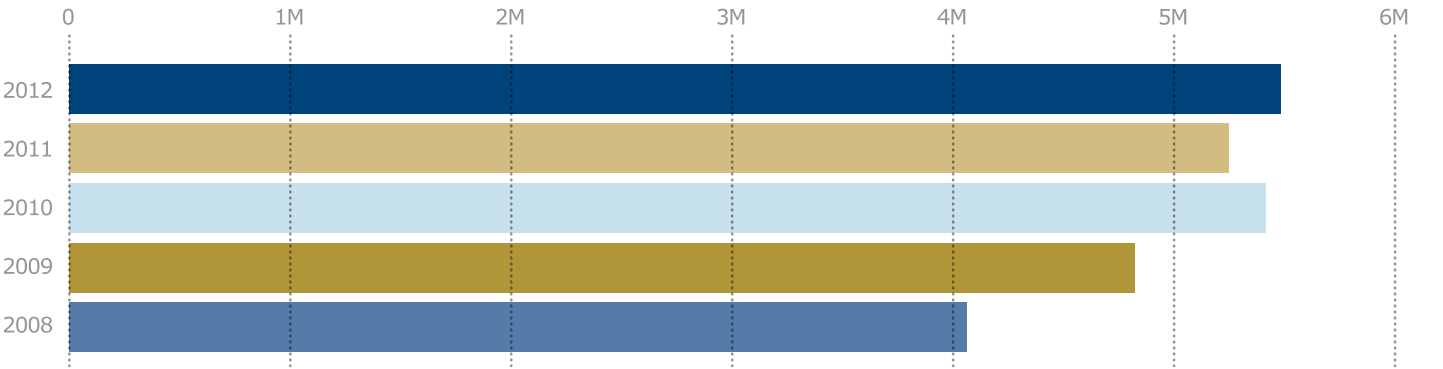

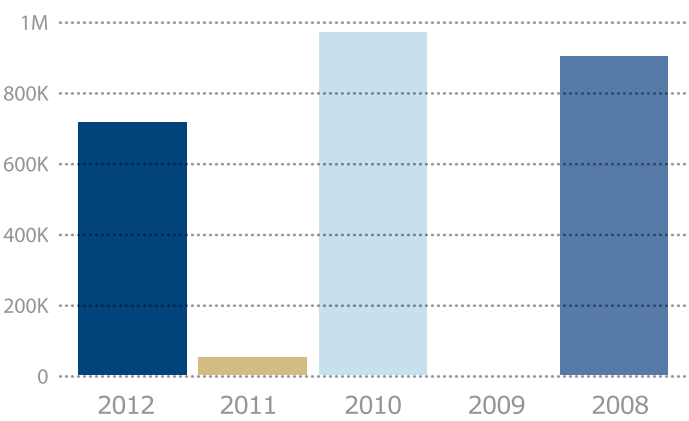

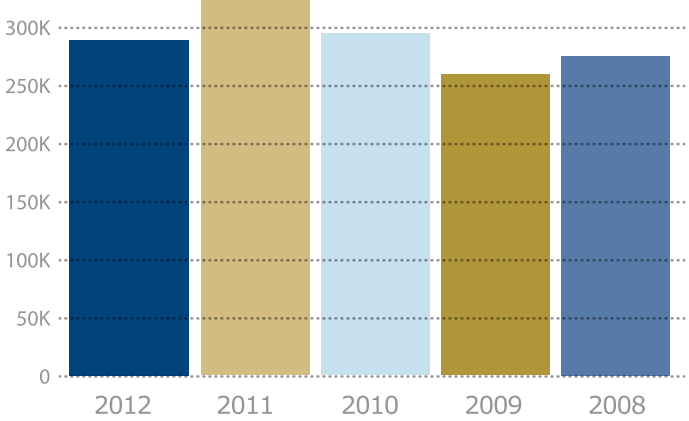
Total Net Assets



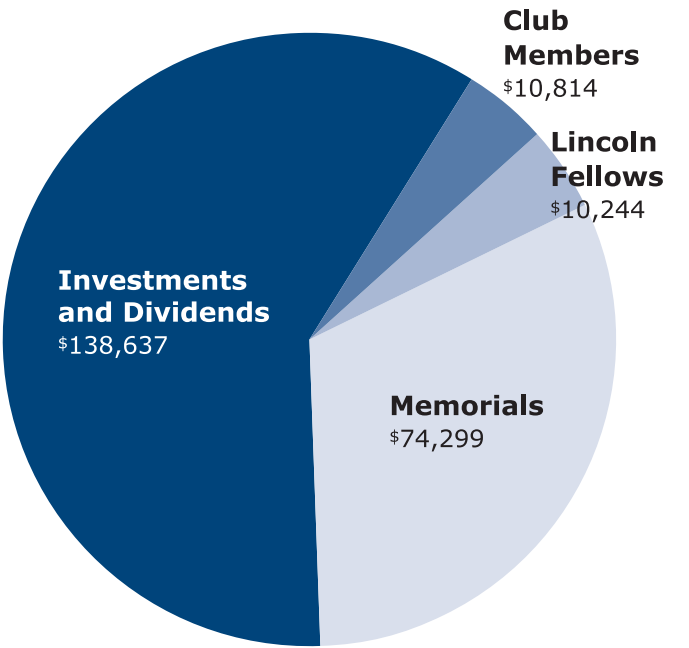
Total Revenue



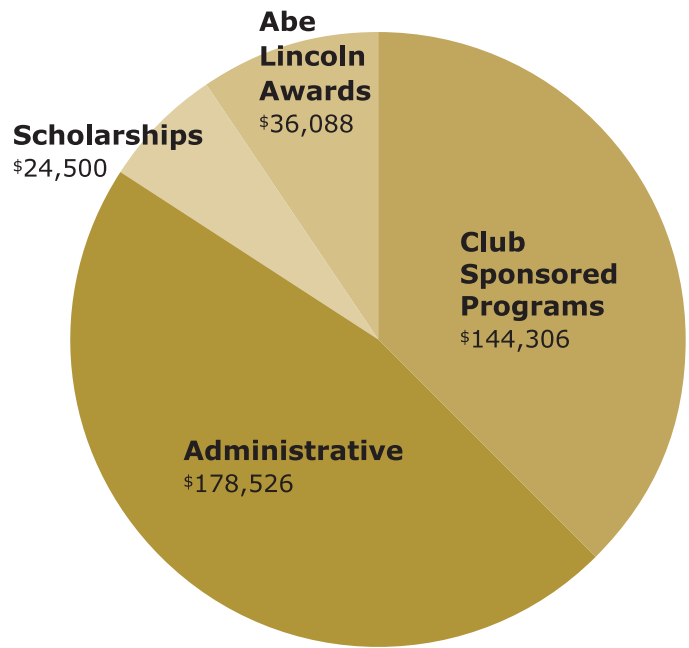
Total Disbursements
